The winning teams qualified for the National level. The event concluded with the National Anthem.

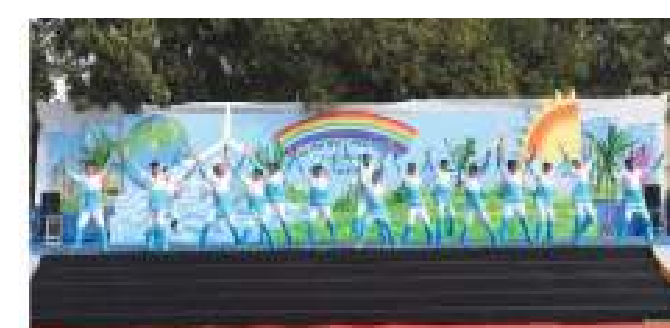


ANNUAL EXHIBITION- 2022
